ASPIRE PROGRAM

The issue of women's self-reliance is most important as it has been found that the situation of women getting vocational training is really grim in the state. The adolescents and young women in rural society don't have proper career counselling / guidance to manage the skills and use potential for their economic empowerment. As per the CULP survey It was found that only 14% women in the age group of 20-30 years are engaged in some kind of vocational training which is very low and the percentage dips further in case of women aged 15-19 years. The situation of child and women health and hygiene is grimmer in the marginalized communities (minorities and tribal) where CULP works. Thus, a multi-pronged approach was required which should focus on planning, supply chain management, capacity building,

Behaviour change communication, monitoring, review and evaluation, we aim to improve the survival and health of those who need it most, especially women, adolescent girls and young children.

Keeping this in view a formal collaboration was established between CULP and The Desai Foundation Trust in 2021 for implementation of the 'ASPIRE PROGRAM', beginning from one block in Tonk district now scaled-up in larger area of more blocks and two districts in rural Rajasthan. The program also get support from Crowd Funding on Give India Platform.

Goal

The over-arching goal of the project is to create enabling social environment for Girls and Women to Lead a Dignified and Healthy Life with their full potential. The program activities have specific goal to improve social and economic life in select habitations of rural Rajasthan, and to develop and implement health, hygiene, educational & vocational programs to promote quality of life in underprivileged communities.



ACTIVITIES

Health & Awareness Camps

The objective of the camps was not only to provide health services but also work to sensitize rural population on good health practices and positive health seeking behaviours. The camps focused on four different components general / specialized care, awareness programs, screening and referral services.



Organized 13 health camps: 3 General health camps, 4 Women / Gynae Health camps (including one for Cancer detection), 2 Paediatric, 2 Eye & 2 Dental health check-up) till March 2023 by collaborating with local District

Administration / CM&HOs, GPs, NGOs (Rajasthan Eye Bank Society) & other Hospitals (SMS Hospital, Cradle Hospital, Siddham ENT Hospital).



Bal Health Mela

The vision behind organizing Bal Health Mela was to create a community of health through fun interactive games and educational activities for children and their caretakers in rural Indian communities.

The Mela held on 29 November 2022 at Government Senior Secondary School-Kalakho, block- Dausa, district- Dausa (Rajasthan). The Mela was duly supported by the teachers, resource persons and volunteers who are working in the community. 1040 students actively took part in this event.

In the Bal Health Mela, various activities took place.

- Body Mass Index(BMI)
- Health Check-up



- Drawing/Painting- where we asked students to draw and paint the human body organs and its structure.
- Sciences miracles
- Science experiments like reflection and refraction and air in the empty glass.



- Introduction to equipment where our resource person introduced to them telescope, microscope, binocular stethoscope and globe.
- Film/movie presentation where we focused on inspirational video. So, one documentary inspiration video of Bhagat Singh was screened.



- Health and Hygiene Awareness session
- Outdoor games such as musical chair, spoon race and hurdle race.

Banking & Saving Education & Awareness Program

The purpose of conducting these sessions was to make aware women on banking procedures and inculcate saving habits which are essential for them to manage funds for their family needs, when they decide to utilize their acquired skills for earning purpose. Also, the session focused around basic management of funds within a household which is essential to not create debts or liabilities.



Four Sessions were conducted during the year with 153 beneficiaries in both Tonk and Dausa districts.

Sessions included with a detailed orientation of the terms credit, debit and debt. Along with the rules, regulations and procedures of vigilant banking were also described.

Entrepreneurship Development Training

The objective of conducting these training sessions were to introduce participants to the concept of creating a business, Introduction to skills required to establish entrepreneurial source of earning and encourage women to work in a team and generate a living.



These sessions have been planned exclusively with the beneficiaries of skill training centres being run by CULP. Total four sessions were organized with 114

beneficiaries. The sessions included the discussion on five phases of Entrepreneurship i.e. Discovery, Developing business plan, Collecting Resources, Managing the company and Harvesting.

Entrepreneurship Awareness Sessions

Entrepreneurship Awareness Sessions are mandatory interactive sessions to be conducted with all the beneficiaries of our skill training centers. Hence it was planned accordingly that all the training centers, i.e. the computer skill training and the Sewing skill training centers will receive these sessions on a cyclic basis according to the new batches. These sessions are planned to be introduced in the middle of the quarter with the purpose that the beneficiaries should be first acquainted with the skill training in order to be able to think further about this concept. The session aims to introduce these potential minds towards the various scopes of employment and engagement as professionals in future. Entrepreneurship awareness sessions were held in both the districts with 589 skill training beneficiaries

Skill Training Program

Candle & Diya Making Workshop

The objective of the workshop was to make women capable to start earning, to develop Self-Esteem and Self-Confidence in women, to support Women's professional and personal development through education and training and to encourage them to enhance their skills and to start their own start up.

The Candle & Diya Making Training program was held from 26 to 28 September 2022 at CULP office Jhilai, Newai, Tonk, Rajasthan. For this program initially total 30 potential beneficiaries were identified on the basis of their interest/enthusiasm but at the time of program the total potential beneficiaries were 34. The trainer Mrs. Nayanaben Mahida was called from Gujarat for the training. She took 4 hours training each day where she taught how to make different types of candles and diyas.



Skill Training Centres

Skill Training Program was launched by CULP under ASPIRE project in Dausa and Tonk districts of Rajasthan for training in computer as well as in Sewing to adolescent girls and young women.

5 Sewing Training Centers & 5 computer Centers are in operation in Dausa & Tonk districts, benefited 637 girls in this year. Each centre run 3 months duration courses enrolling 20-25 girls in each batch.



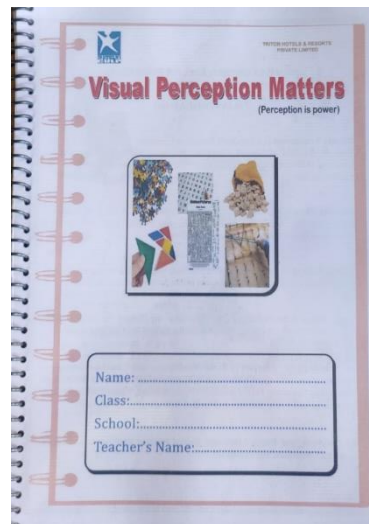
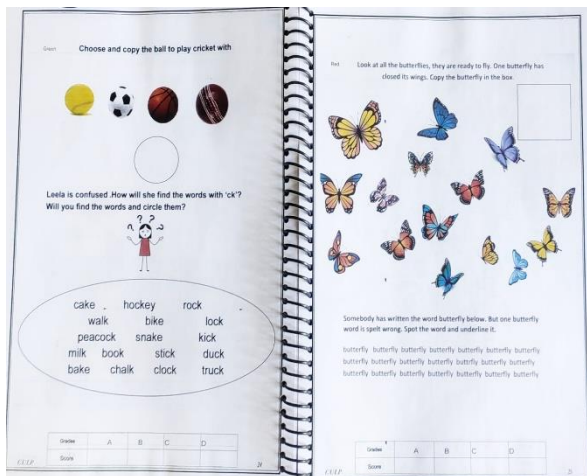
VISUAL PERCEPTION MATTERS PROGRAM

The Visual Perception Matters program is being implemented by CULP in collaboration with 'Triton Hotels and Resorts Pvt. Ltd.' in the select schools of Jaipur city from April 2021. Visual perception refers to information that is perceived through the eyes. In preschool children this perception is still developing, and continues to develop right through primary school. Total number of 500 students from a cross section of schools, including main stream schools, rural schools, schools for the under privileged and development center from Jaipur. The target group of the students will be Students from Classes 1 and 2. The three-year program aims to create a booklet of activities for the key component areas of visual perceptual skills.

The booklets will consist of grade related activities for each of the three key



components of visual perception skills



FREE EDUCATION PROGRAM

Free Education for children with Specific Learning Disability (SLD), from economically weaker section of society. The program serves children from grades 1 to 12, building competencies like self-awareness, self-management, relationship skills, social awareness, and responsible decision making. Currently CULP is providing fee support to 15 such students with the financial arrangements with Triton Hotels. The objectives of the program is to-

- Provide educational and skill based opportunities for the SLD children.
- Facilitate their retention in the school system.
- Provide intensive early intervention for children with development delay who may be at risk of learning disability.
- Create a happy, healthy and stress-free environment where children can develop and learn at a pace that is right for them.
- Create a unified educational program using modern and traditional teaching methods.



HEROES FOR HUMANITY PROGRAM

CULP and Desai Foundation Trust carried out a COVID response program in the two districts of Rajasthan in which they distributed ration kits to the needy families and hygiene kits as an awareness program for prevention of the disease in the month of May-June 2021. The DFT then decided to merge this COVID response program in to a new and bigger program called 'Heroes for Humanity (HfH)' program which was initiated in August 2021 in the locations where CULP works.

Activities

1. Help Desk

The objective of the program is to create awareness and knowledge about the government Schemes / basic Document and their use for the Beneficiary community through Workshops and Sessions and to become a Bridge between system and community through collecting information of beneficiary and interlinking the data of beneficiaries With the Document and Scheme.

Help Desk program planned by CULP & Desai Foundation Trust is going to help in creating awareness among the beneficiary in the 7 states, about the rights of citizens and welfare Schemes provided by the government.



Through the support of ground staff (CF/CFH) in their communities to ensure the Accessibility of government Social Protection Schemes & basic documents like Aadhar card/ ration card / Krishi card. Helpdesk program will work as an enabler to Bridge the gap between Law and the Action made by the Government in a faster and efficient way.

2. Menstrual Hygiene Management Awareness

The menstrual hygiene Management awareness program was started to generate awareness of menstrual health and hygiene amongst the village population in order to break numerous stereotypes. The beneficiaries of the program are adolescent girls and women in the village community i.e. about the half population of our project area.

The women identified in our HFH team who possess the capacity to conduct MHM awareness sessions have been given the responsibility of conducting a certain number of sessions each month along with their regular activities. In these sessions the

resource person explains the scientific factors of Menstruation, questions stereotypes and explains its consequences on the human body, explains about effective ways of managing one's periods and to respond to bodily changes and issues.

3. Primary Health & Hygiene Education (Community & Schools)



CULP believes that the health and well-being of children and youth must be a fundamental value of society. Primary Health Education Program Assisted in the holistic development of the children through providing age-appropriate information about health and nutrition to the children in schools. In this program, we also cover

RISE UP TOGETHER PROGRAM

Rise Up partners with local leaders around the world, including in Africa, South Asia, Latin America, and the United States. Rise up Leaders transform their communities by successfully advocating for laws, policies, and programs that improve the lives of women, girls, and gender-nonconforming people. CULP's team member Hemant is one of such leaders in Rajasthan.

CULP has been working for an 'Advocacy program for special education for out of school adolescent girls in Rajasthan' under this program. The program activities are based in Niwai block of Tonk district of Rajasthan.

Activities

- Rapid Household Survey conducted for identification of out-of-school girls in 50 habitations of 25 Gram Panchayats in two blocks (Niwai block: GPs = 16 and Piplu block: GP = 9) of Tonk district. **258 out-of-school girls have been identified through rapid household survey in 50 habitations of two blocks.**
- Formed 10 adolescent girls groups in two blocks; but 15 more groups are to be formed soon.
- 3-Day leadership building training of 5 Girl leaders in collaboration with GNB Rajasthan Alliance (19 – 21 December 2022).
- The representatives of adolescent girls groups from Niwai block also participated in the state level two girls' conventions, one at Jaipur on 11th October 2022 and second in Alwar on 28th and 29th January 2023 by GNB Partners.

- Two adolescent Girls participated in capacity building workshop on the issues of married girls organized by Vikalp in collaboration with GNB Rajasthan Alliance at Udaipur from 2nd to 4th November 2022.



PEHCHAN PROGRAM

CULP with financial assistance of 'Too Young to Wed', USA is implementing the Program for empowering girls of socially excluded communities through life skills & relevant education in rural Rajasthan. Under this program Six Bridge Course / Learning centres were proposed to organize for 150 out-of-school adolescent girls for a short duration of eight (8) months for imparting age and grade appropriate competencies to them and mainstream them in age-appropriate grades in nearby government schools.

Apart from organizing bridge course Centres, vocational skill training centres were also being run under contingency plan for 50 adolescent girls and young women for inculcating among them the employability skills. The another important aspect of the program is to inculcate Life Skills to the target girls so that they become empowered to take their life decisions and practice better menstrual and hygiene behaviour for which special sessions and trainings have been organized regularly.



Activities

1. **Rapid household Survey** of target population and micro-plans in target villages was done in 25 Gram Panchayats (Villages) in Niwai block of Tonk district to ascertain the number of out of school adolescent girls using

google forms. Through this survey 210 out-of-school adolescent girls were identified.

2. **Bridge Course Centres:** Started three bridge course centres, one in each of three locations viz. two centres, one in each of Panch Kuan and Kachchi Basti in Jugalpura Gram Panchayat and one centre in Kareem Bax ki Dhani in Lalwadi Gram Panchayat in Niwai (Tonk district) where 79 out of-school adolescent girls are enrolled (average 26 girls per centre). 80% of the enrolled girls attend the centres daily for average 5 hours per day and 24 to 25 days per month. Habitation-wise enrolment status of the girls in three centres is as follows: Kareem bax ki Dhani = 23 Girls; Kachchi Basti Jugalpura = 31 Girls and Panch Kuan Jugalpura = 25 Girls

3. **Vocational training courses** have been organized for the adolescent girls who have crossed the age of attending the formal schools and showed the inclination of acquiring some employability skills like sewing and computer operating skills. A three month course has been designed and started to implement for a batch of 20 girls in each trade. 3 centres (two for sewing and one centre for computer skills) were made operational in Niwai block at different locations viz. Rajwas and Jhilai for two sewing centres and one computer training centre in Niwai. The first batch of 60 adolescent girls (16+ and Young women (upto 30 years) completed their 3-month course during the period from Mid-January 2023 to April-end 2023). The program also get support from Crowd Funding on Give India Platform.



Research Study/Survey/Documentation

Girls Back to Schools: 'A Research Study on Girls' Re-Joining to Schools after COVID-19 Closure' by 'Girls Not Brides, Rajasthan Alliance' was coordinated by CULP to assess the dropout of the girls at secondary level after the re-opening of schools and to understand the factors promoting the girl's secondary & higher education.



GIRLS BACK TO SCHOOLS
A Research Study on Girls Re-Joining to Schools in Rajasthan after COVID-19 Closure
by Girls Not Brides, Rajasthan



The study entailed the content scrutiny and secondary analysis of the relevant available documents, viz. recent study / survey reports, articles in research periodicals, print and social media, and government notifications. The desk study involved screening, reviewing and reflecting on relevant data and information culled out to assess the impact of emergent situation on aspects of education of girls. The relevant findings and results were elicited which could help to understand and provide valid support in discussions on the basis of the analysis of the collected data of the present study conducted with study of girls studying targeted grades (class 9 to 12) in Rajasthan.

Objectives of the study were

1. To assess the dropout of the girls at secondary level after the re-opening of schools.
2. To understand the factors promoting the girl's secondary & higher education.
3. Exploring the workable alternative models of education for those girls who are not part of formal school system.
4. To draw the specific recommendations for the government to take relevant provisions in policies and programs.

The study sample consisted of the data collected from the sampled Senior Secondary Schools on Girls promoted from Classes 8, 9 and 11 to classes 9, 10 and 12 respectively and No of Girls got admission and girls actually attended in Government Senior Secondary Schools during the academic years from 2019-20 to 2022-23.

Key Findings

- 19% of the Girls enrolled in grade 8 in AY 2019-20 did not reach the appropriate class 11 in AY 2022-23.
- The gap is higher when the transition from grade 9 (AY 2019-20) to grade 11 (AY 2022-23) is tracked. 26 % less girls were enrolled in grade 12.
- Almost 16% girls enrolled in grade 10 (AY 2019-20) did not continue their study in AY 2022-23
- In the case of girls enrolled in class XI in AY 2019-20, 10% of them could not pass in class XII examination of AY 2021-22.....

Palanhar Yojana in Rajasthan: ‘A Field Study of the Cash Transfer Scheme to the Vulnerable Children’ with support of Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences and Unicef to provide field level insights in the larger body of work through documentation of the journey, progress, and growth pattern of the Scheme.

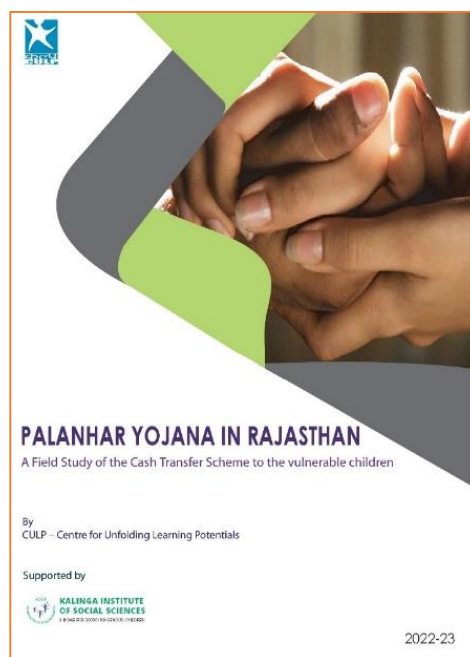
The study was an out-come of the need and collaborative effort of UNICEF, Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences and Centre for Unfolding Learning Potentials (CULP). The study reflects on the ground reality of the implementation of the scheme through the qualitative documentation and identifying the areas of its further improvement.

Objectives of the study

- To provide field level insights in the larger body of work through documentation of the journey, progress, and growth pattern of the Palanhar Scheme.
- To understand the impact on the lives of beneficiaries in holistic by Palanhar 1.0.
- To identify the challenges in the process for scheme to be more beneficiary oriented and recommendation for improving the business process
- To share recommendations for improving the scheme and linking Palanhar scheme with other social benefit schemes including non- cash benefits.

To achieve the above objectives a multi-stakeholders participatory approach was adopted in the design of the qualitative Study of the Palanhar Scheme. A robust analysis framework followed the result- based data

management and reviewed through consultative workshops at state and district levels for which an Assessment matrix was used which included the objective-wise key information areas, source and method. The proposed methods mainly focused on collection of mostly qualitative data.



Key Findings

Big Gender Gap in beneficiary data: About seven lakh children are getting benefitted under the scheme. It has been clearly emerged that only 22 percent of female beneficiary children got registered on the portal till date whereas male beneficiaries are 78 percent.

Lack of Mass Awareness about the Scheme: Very few awareness / IEC and training material is available to government frontline workers, implementers and CBOs to utilize mass awareness and education.

Promoting beneficiary children to enroll or retain in government schools: Around 70% beneficiary children study in private schools

Delay in updation of the beneficiary data on portal: The beneficiary or caregiver is not able to update her information on the portal.

Review and Feedback System: No Effective Channel for Communication between beneficiary / caregivers and the concerned government body at local level (block and

district) since no budgetary provisions are available under the scheme for the same.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism: Not aware where / which government department or official to lodge the grievance.

Ineffective Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) Mechanism: There is no evidences of robust M&E System in place.....

‘Anganwadi diagnostic Study’ of 113 Anganwadis in two districts (Dausa and Tonk) under HfH program to understand the current situation of Anganwadis in order to prepare future intervention strategies.

The study aimed to evaluate various aspects of ICDS scheme in Rajasthan such as the infrastructure of AWCs, baseline characteristics of AWWs, provision and coverage of services to the beneficiaries.

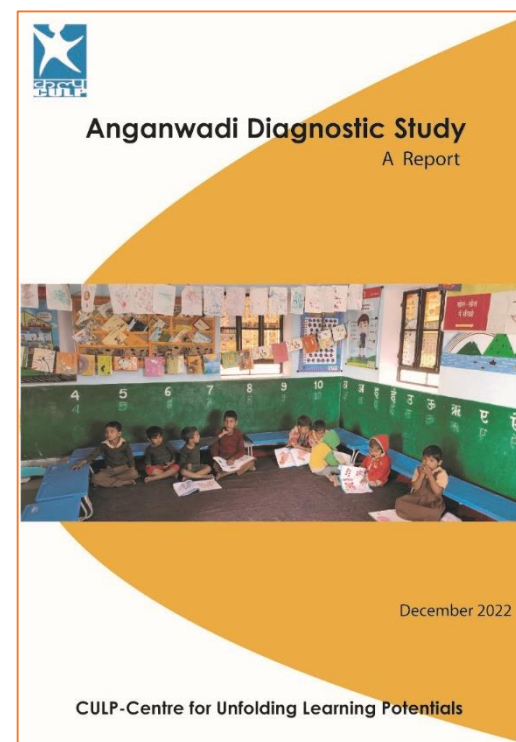
A total of 113 AWCs from a rural area of the two districts were surveyed. AWWs were interviewed, and records were reviewed. Information was collected using a predesigned and pretested questionnaire prepared using google forms. The forms consisted of following eight sections to have an overall picture of an Anganwadi Centre.

Key findings

- Middle aged group women and older women are responsible for the implementation of the ICDS program and running the AWCs.
- 45% workers have completed their secondary education, 29% have 11/12 class certificate. The study could find only 1% worker having certificate course in pre-primary education equipped to tackle pre-primary education aspect of the centres.
- Only 48% AWCs are within 500 meters from the central location of the village.
- The 30% AWCs are situated in their own buildings.
- The facilities available at 113 surveyed Anganwadis reveal that only 26% have electricity connection, 23% have fans. Only 37% have toilets and 38% have drinking water facility.
 - Only 40% centres have good and well ventilated buildings, whereas 53% centres require urgent repairing work.
 - The height / Length measuring machine is found in good condition only in 57% centres. The Weighing Machine for infants is found in

good condition in 68% centres but in 3% centres it was unavailable.

- The first aid box with medicines were found in excellent condition in only 15% centers. In large number of centers (58%) it was found unavailable that is serious.
- Indoor play equipments were not available in 42% Anganwadi Centers.
- Only 32% centers had drinking water storage facility.
- 58% AWWs said that they did not receive any capacity building training during the past 6 months.



Consultation Workshops

State Consultation Meet on Palanhar Yojana: At HCM RIPA Jaipur on 7 December, 2022: CULP in support of UNICEF Rajasthan and Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences (KISS) organized a One-day State Consultation on 'Palanhar Yojana'.

The Key objective of the State Consultation was to 'Assess on Palanhar Scheme 2.0' (One of the Social Protection Schemes of the State Government of Rajasthan for the most vulnerable children), to see progressive trends of the scheme on the lives of beneficiaries and to identify the gaps and sharing



the recommendations.

The consultation was attended by a number of representatives of different civil society organizations, INGOs, Yojana beneficiaries including Palanhar, NGOs and government officials who are directly dealing with the Palanhar Yojana

Network & Advocacy

CULP actively engaged in the following CSOs networks on Policy issues related to Education, Health, Child Marriage, Gender Equity and legal entitlements of the people:

1. Girls Not Brides (GNB) Rajasthan Alliance: a state partnership with GNB Global for ending Child Marriage. The Secretary of CULP co-chairs the Rajasthan chapter.
2. Coalition for Tobacco Control in Rajasthan, recently started an advocacy campaign for making the Rajasthan tobacco Free State through effective compliance of the Provisions of COTPA-2003. CULP is one of founding and core group members of the coalition.
3. Jan Swasthya Abhiyan (JSA) Rajasthan which is campaigning for Health for all in the state. The secretary played key role for drafting the memorandum for bringing Free Health Facility for all the people in the state. The state government has prepared the draft bill in this regard which will be tabled in the forthcoming assembly session.



4. 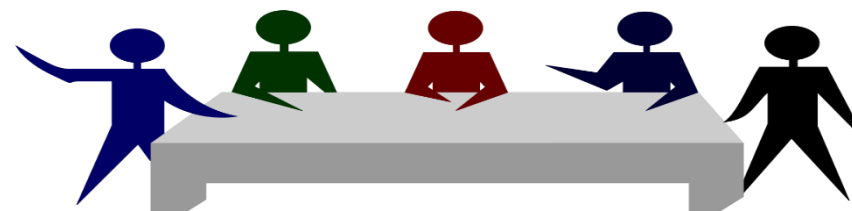




